Attached to this cover sheet is a matrix containing information on the different funding sources available to DEM as part of Senate Bill 00003, the State Disaster Declaration, and House Bill 1001. Within the matrix as well as here in the cover sheet, we have provided a [LINK](#) to a Notice of Interest Survey to collect information on potential projects to be presented to the legislature for review and determination.

Each funding source has a unique use case and focus - described in the attached matrix - and the notice of interest will help DEM to determine the most appropriate funding source for each project to be submitted under.

Once initial information is gathered from the notice of funding (currently open with a pending deadline) official applications will be made available to collect details and define the scope of work for each project.

The attached matrix identifies the funding source, amount currently or potentially available, eligible applicants, eligible costs, the application process, time frame, and currently determined matching requirements. There are a few key decisions requiring information from the Notice of Interest before a determination can be made. Any information not currently addressed in this cover sheet, the matrix, or the survey will be addressed in the application.

For a project to be eligible for the largest number of potential funding sources, they will need to be supported by a Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA). Information on damage assessments can be found [HERE](#). Preliminary Damage Assessments also aid the Division of Emergency Management in pursuing additional funding opportunities such as Federal Public Assistance.

Official applications, determinations, obligations, and awards will primarily happen during the recovery phase of the 2023 Statewide Flooding Event.
